# Conversations on Religion and Diplomacy

## Convenings by diplomats and religious studies experts

The Transatlantic Policy Network on Religion and Diplomacy (TPNRD) at Georgetown University unites religious studies scholars and foreign affairs officials from Europe and North America to inform diplomatic engagement in global religious affairs. The TPNRD's main events include public, educational conversations and biannual meetings of diplomats hosted by participating foreign ministries. TPNRD members include representatives from the European External Action Service, the US Department of State, Austria, Belgium, Canada, Czech Republic, Finland, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, the United Nations, and the Order of Malta.

### Recent Diplomatic Meetings

The goal of TPNRD biannual conferences aim to equip diplomats to increase religious literacy among key actors in foreign affairs, improve analysis of global developments in religion, and strategize progress towards shared policy objectives.

### *The Sarajevo Conference (November 15-18, 2023)*

The European Union delegation of Sarajevo hosted [this conference](#). It included local diplomats, scholars and activists, as well as clerics from the Muslim, Christian, and Jewish traditions. During these meetings, the TPNRD explored issues related to religion and peacebuilding, inclusion, governance, and interfaith collaboration.

The Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople hosted the TPNRD [conference in Istanbul](#). The major discussion points were the Patriarchate's role in global issues such as the war in Ukraine as well as human trafficking, global climate change and interfaith dialogue.

Hosted by the Order of Malta, the [Rome conference](#) included an overview of the humanitarian work of the Order of Malta, brainstorming new TPNRD-commissioned policy reports, meetings between TPNRD members and the Vatican, and engagement with a host of religious and civil society leaders based in Rome.

TPNRD's French colleagues hosted the [gathering in Strasbourg](#) at the Council of Europe building. This meeting enabled the TPNRD to meet with senior officials at the Council of Europe and judges at the European Court of Human Rights. The conference's discussions pertained to commissioning new TPNRD reports, the relationship between religion and state in the Alsace region, and collaboration between the region's religious leaders.
